

Daniel C. Hurley, jr.

In March, 2001, Daniel C. Hurley Jr. became Director of the Communications and Information Infrastructure Assurance Program at the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) in the U.S. Department of Commerce. Mr. Hurley joined the Department of Commerce after retiring as a Captain in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

Before coming to NTIA, Mr. Hurley held a number of positions at the Commerce Department in the Bureau of Export Administration (BXA), which has now become the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS). Between 1975 and 1991, Mr. Hurley was an attorney-advisor in the Department's Office of Chief Counsel for Export Administration, where he was litigation counsel for BXA in export enforcement and anti-boycott compliance proceedings, and represented BXA in a wide range of national security industrial base-related programs. From 1991 to 1993, as head of the Foreign Industry Analysis Division in BXA, Mr. Hurley managed the preparation of foreign availability assessments, as well as foreign industry analyses of several militarily critical technologies.

From 1993 to 1995, Mr. Hurley served as Senior Advisor to the Under Secretary for Export Administration. As a Senior Advisor in BXA, Mr. Hurley headed the export control international cooperation mission involving 25 countries in the New Independent States of the former Soviet Union and central European regions. In this position, Mr. Hurley performed analyses of defense conversion opportunities in the New Independent States and China, and coordinated appeals of export enforcement and anti-boycott cases.

Mr. Hurley holds B.S. and M.A. degrees in mathematics from St. Louis University. After serving as a Naval Officer in Southeast Asia, he earned a J.D. degree from Georgetown University. He also earned a M.B.A. in strategic management from George Mason University. Before retiring as a Captain in the U.S. Naval Reserve, Mr. Hurley completed senior courses at the Naval War College and the National Security Agency, and served as commanding officer of five reserve units.

Mr. Hurley co-authored "The Aircraft Manufacturing Industry" and "Airbus Industrie: An Industry Approach to Cases in Strategic Management." He also wrote "An Organized Approach to Environmental Scanning," "Japanese Style Management: Pearls from the Orient or Yankee Know-How?" and "Banks and Countertrade: Without Rose-colored Glasses."

Mr. Hurley serves as a volunteer with the Boy Scouts of America, operating at the district and council levels in Northern Virginia and the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area. He and his wife, Mary Ellen, reside in Fairfax Station, Virginia.
